E-bike safety

Thanks to everyone who has written to or spoken with me about e-bikes, e-scooters and other electric mobility devices.

Electric mobility devices are now an important and convenient part of urban transport, but law enforcement and regulation need to catch up for everyone's safety.

Following community feedback, my Liberal team in 2024 successfully moved for a Parliamentary Inquiry to consider the issues, receive submissions and make recommendations on how to manage electric mobility devices. The Inquiry released its report and recommendations in February 2025.

The Minns Labor Government delivered its response in May. I'm disappointed that, after such a long period, the Government still hasn't made or even proposed any progress on law enforcement or regulation to overcome serious safety concerns plaguing e-bikes, including in the Cronulla area.

I've raised community concerns about unsafe rider behaviour and that laws are not being enforced with police. I've also asked Council to review signage in key locations where bikes are prohibited in Cronulla such as the Mall and the Esplanade. I welcome recent local police operations targeting misuse of e-bikes. However our police need the government to give them practical laws and regulations to get the balance right between convenience for users and safety of the whole community.



Kurnell visitor centre update

It was great to visit Kamay Botany Bay National Park recently and see the new visitor centre taking shape.

The visitor centre is part of a package of improvements in the Park planned and funded under the previous state and federal Liberal Governments to mark the 250th anniversary of Cook's landing and the first east coast encounter between European and Aboriginal people.

The new building is expected to be completed in 2026 and will offer improved visitor facilities, exhibition space, as well as education and learning areas and a base for park operations.

The exhibition space will enable the four Gweagal spears taken from the site in 1770 to be returned to Kurnell.

Kamay wharves

The new matching wharves in Kamay Botany Bay National Park at Kurnell and La Perouse have now opened.

The wharves are great public infrastructure, but to achieve their potential and what they were especially built for, we need the government to provide or subsidise a local and tourist ferry service – like it does with just about every other public transport service in NSW.



Kurnell anchor

The replica anchor that stood at the Kurnell vehicle entry to Kamay Botany Bay National Park is being relocated to another place within the Park.

The replica and adjacent brick wall were installed in 1972 and were removed in April as part of improvement works. The National Parks and Wildlife Service is planning restoration and repair works on the anchor before it is installed in a new location.

Cricket Pitch facilities open

Upgrades to the Cricket Pitch precinct in Kamay Botany Bay National Park are now open to visitors.

There are now 34 more car spaces, including accessible parking and path connections, bicycle racks and water bottle filling stations.

A new amenity building has been constructed at the precinct like the recently completed building at Commemoration Flat. It replaces the old, corroded steel amenities.



The freshwater stream has been rehabilitated (see image above). Concrete piped sections of the creek have been removed and the natural creek bed restored. A slow-flow pond area has been created to provide habitat for wildlife such as frogs and a new pedestrian walkway has been built across the stream to connect the upgraded Cricket Pitch to the new visitor centre.

Hungry Point clifftop walkway update

Construction of the Hungry Point clifftop walkway by Sutherland Shire Council continues, with it now expected to be open in late August following some weather-related delays.

The project includes viewing platforms and a raised and suspended boardwalk that will enable visitors to better enjoy the beautiful views of Port Hacking across to Bundeena and Maianbar.

I was glad to secure funding for the walkway when in government and I know there is great expectation in the community for the extension of the Cronulla Esplanade.



Cronulla Woman of the Year

Cronulla surf lifesaving leader and business owner Fiona Sutton is the 2025 Cronulla Woman of the Year.

Fiona has been an active volunteer and leader at the Wanda Surf Life Saving Club and is currently its president.

As a driving force in Wanda's 'nippers' that introduces children aged 5 to 14 to surf lifesaving, one of Fiona's proudest achievements as Chair of the club's Junior Activities Group is the successful introduction of the inclusive and accessible 'Red Fins' program.



Once a nipper herself, Fiona holds 13 surf lifesaving awards and a Bronze Medallion in Public Safety and Aquatic Rescue. Fiona has also continued to play an active part on the safety of beachgoers as a member of Wanda's surf patrols.

Fiona also runs her own successful small business. The Wanda club describes her as an inspirational leader, much loved mum, and friend to all in the club family and beyond.

Gymea parking update

I'm regularly asked by community members if the former car parking south of Gymea shopping centre can be made available again for public parking.

The Gymea Bay Road site, just south of President Avenue, provided parking for commuters, shoppers and people attending events at local churches until it was closed in 2019 following the discovery of materials containing asbestos.



Remediation began under the previous Liberal Government. Work was due to be completed in June 2023. I was told by the Minns Labor Government in 2023 that remediation of the site was expected to be complete by the end of 2023 and the site ready to be accessed in early 2024. Now more than a year later, crews have turned up on site again.

I'm calling on the Government to get the remediation finalised and return the site to the community. Extra parking in Gymea will be a big boost for local shopkeepers, commuters using Gymea Station and local community organisations holding community events.

Cronulla seniors awards

Robert Bryant of Kirrawee, a stalwart of water polo in the Sutherland Shire, is the 2025 Cronulla Senior of the Year.

Robert has made an enormous volunteer contribution to water polo in the Sutherland Shire over half a century of involvement with the sport locally.

Affectionately known as 'Rocko', Robert has continually dedicated his own time to pass on his knowledge and skills as a two time Olympian to up and coming players.

He's been a coach and mentor for both the Cronulla club and the Sutherland Shire Junior Water Polo Association and can be found at the Sutherland Leisure Centre most days and evenings helping teams and coaches.

Robert is also actively involved with planning and organising the junior association's 'Polobility' competition, a modified game allowing young people with disabilities to get involved in water polo.

On top of volunteer efforts, Robert notched his 900th game for the Cronulla Sharks in 2024.

His community involvement has extended to Cronulla Polar Bears, Elouera Surf Life Saving Club and St Patrick's Football Club.
